The Steering Committee approved action to open a WOW club checking account and close the existing personal account. This will bring the club up to current banking standards. **John Rodgers** will begin the process by accumulating the required documentation.

Our members are not signing in at the meetings. The guest speakers need an accurate count of our attending members so they are prepared with adequate materials. Several remedies were discussed including a roll call. As the members arrive they may be carrying projects and other items that must be cared for before they sign in and some times it just seems to be too much trouble. The bookcase project for Adventure Park will be getting underway soon. We plan on setting up a build team with a project manager at the March meeting. **Harlan Jeche** has volunteered his home as the build site.

The doll cradle project needs to be examined and changes made. **Hunter Smith** has been the mainstay of this project for many years and cannot continue the work. Optional build processes will be discussed at the March meeting.

### **Steering Committee**

**There were only seven members At the Feb. meeting.** This is not enough of us to be making important decisions for the club.

We meet at Whittier Senior Center, 13225 Walnut Street in Uptown Whittier at 7:00 P.M. This is where all the discussion and planning for future meetings comes from and usually lasts less than an hour.

### **Christmas Projects**

This is an over view of WOW's Mission Statement and Toy Projects. The club was founded in 1993 to provide wooden toy Christmas gifts for disadvantaged youth in the Whittier area. The toys are given to several charitable and service groups toy drives for distribution to the children. This includes the Red Cross, Salvation Army, Catholic Charities, Whittier P. D., Marine Corps Reserve, L. A. County Fire Dept. and others.

Currently we have three different toy projects led by **Joe Carrillo** Block and Toy Coordinator. Building blocks, wheeled toys and doll cradles. Each of these will be discussed separately in future months.

Blocks are cut in home shops or at Hathaway Ranch and sanded at Hathaway Ranch on Monday mornings. Every one is encouraged to take part in this operation. It is an easy way to get involved with the toy projects. Patterns and wood are provided.

Wheeled toys are cut and sanded in home shops. Plans, wood and wheels are made available and most woods are acceptable and toy makers are encouraged to be creative. Wheels and toys are assembled at a regularly scheduled monthly meeting and every one is involved.

The doll cradle project has largely been a one-man operation. **Hunter Smith** has cut and sanded the components due to the complexity of fitting the various parts. The cradles are then assembled and painted by a few woodworkers. Dolls and quilts or blankets are furnished by the doll project of the Whittier Senior Center. This project will be our topic of discussion at the March meeting with changes anticipated.

WOW has done several service projects for the Red Cross, Intercommunity Blind Center, Boys and Girls Club and Friends of the Library. Service projects remain an important function of our commitment to the community.
